Trades

Gain the skills necessary to get started in the trades. From horticulture to heavy duty equipment, welding to wastewater management, you can start your career with one of our certificates, diplomas or degrees.

Understanding Trades Training:

Foundation programs provide hands-on practical knowledge and expertise to prepare you for entry into the skilled-trades workforce. Program graduates receive credit for at least the first year of in-school apprenticeship training, plus a substantial number of work-based hours towards their trade.

Apprenticeship programs provide in-school theory and practical training. An employer sponsors an employee to be registered with the Industry Training Authority of BC as an apprentice. Apprenticeship training usually consists of four levels of schooling, with each level lasting from four to ten weeks. Apprentices earn while they learn —the majority of apprenticeship training involves work-based, paid hours on the job. Many trades allow you to earn a Red Seal designation, a standard of excellence recognized across Canada and the world.

What do I need to get in?

Changes to the BC Curriculum

There are currently no changes to TRU's admissions requirements. Further details will be available online in 2019.

Depending on the program, qualified applicants are admitted based on three admission processes:

- Non-Competitive Admission: Admission decisions are made on a first-applied, first-qualified basis. Course upgrading is available in these programs.
- 2. **Limited Admission:** Admission decisions are made on a first-qualified basis. These programs have a limited number of seats.
- 3. Competitive Admission: Admission decisions are made on a competitive basis. Applications will be assessed using criteria that may include an admissions average, interviews, questionnaires and letters of reference. These programs have a limited number of seats and a set application deadline. Applications may continue to be accepted after the application deadline if space permits.

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

TRU programs generally require BC high school graduation or equivalent. Exceptions to this requirement will be indicated in the program admission requirements listed on pages 17 – 28.

You may be considered to have the equivalent of BC high school graduation for admission purposes if you have completed:

- the BC Adult Graduation (Adult Dogwood) diploma, or previously the ABE Provincial diploma
- the General Education Diploma (GED)

In some circumstances, certain programs may accept students without high school graduation under mature student status.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

English is the language of instruction at TRU. Applicants are expected to be able to demonstrate language proficiency. TRU will verify that applicants meet language proficiency requirements prior to admission.

If you don't meet your program's English Language requirement, you may meet and/or obtain the equivalency through additional coursework and/or approved English placement assessment:

- **Additional Coursework:** University Preparation courses (campus or distance)
- **Assessment:** TRU Accuplacer, Language Proficiency Index (LPI)

PROGRAM SPECIFIC ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

In addition to meeting the general admission requirements you will need to ensure you meet your program's specific admission requirements listed on pages 17 – 28, or see **tru.ca/calendar**.

PROVINCIAL AND OTHER ADMISSION EQUIVALENTS

TRU recognizes and acknowledges the differences between provincial education requirements.

You are considered to have the equivalent of BC high school graduation if you graduated from high school in:

- Alberta, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Ontario (after 2003), Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan, Northwest Territories, Nunavut, or Yukon
- Quebec, and have completed one full academic year at CEGEP

You are also considered to have the equivalent of BC high school graduation if you have completed the International Baccalaureate diploma program.

For program specific provincial admission equivalents, see the equivalency chart on page 34.

Alberta students note: TRU takes the blended final mark (diploma and course) for ELA 30-1, and for all other courses, we will take whatever grade is highest—diploma or course.

WHAT IF I DON'T MEET PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS?

If you don't meet the program specific admission requirements but do meet the general admission requirement (or equivalent), you can be accepted to a non-competitive admission program. You will also be able to upgrade any required courses for that program, or a limited or competitive admission program.

ADVANCED STANDING AND ENRICHED PROGRAMS

TRU recognizes and awards credit to both Canadian and international students who complete enriched secondary school programs.

- International Baccalaureate: Transfer credit granted for higher level courses passed with a grade of 5 or higher

TRU is home to students from all over the world and we welcome applications from international students. If you are currently enrolled in a BC high school (or equivalent) you must meet the minimum requirements for direct entry into first-year academic programs:

- BC high school graduation (or equivalent)
- 73% in English 12

If you don't meet your program's English Language requirement, you may meet and/or obtain the equivalency through additional coursework or approved English placement assessment:

- Additional Coursework: English as a Second Language (ESAL) course
- **Assessment:** TRU English Placement Test, TOEFL (iBT: 88+ with no sections below 2.0), IELTS (6.5+ with no bands below 6.0) or Pearson Test of English

COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY TRANSFER

Academic transfer credit is assessed at the time of admission and upon receipt of official transcripts and any required supporting documentation. To qualify as a transfer student, you must be in good academic standing. Applicants from BC/Yukon refer to **bctransferguide.ca** for a listing of transferable courses. You may transfer up to a maximum of 60 credits for campus based programs. To qualify for the TRU Transfer Scholarships, you must have completed a minimum of 12 credits in the previous academic year.



Applying to TRU

- Apply online at tru.ca/apply
- Applications for Fall 2019 open on October 1, 2018.
 Make sure you apply early as some programs fill quickly.
- The application fee for Canadian citizen or permanent resident students is \$29.25; for international students it is \$100.00.

Please note: Applications for trades programs are accepted throughout the year.

Arrange for final transcripts

TRU requires receipt of official transcripts for all offers of admission. For many applicants, there are multiple methods of transcript submission.

Current BC high school students: You must give permission for your official interim and final grades to be automatically sent to TRU from the Ministry of Education. Sign up at the time of your first application at www.bced.gov.bc.ca/exams/tsw/tsw/student

All other applicants: Arrange to have your official final transcripts (high school and any post-secondary) sent directly from the issuing institution to TRU. In some circumstances, electronic submission may be available.

Many programs require receipt of official transcripts at the time of application and, at the completion of any courses in progress. In this case, you will be required to submit your official transcripts more than once. Please refer to your communication from TRU Admissions regarding documentation.

Submit any required additional documents

Some programs will require additional admission documents such as (but not limited to) letters of intent, reference letters, and pre-testing results.

The supporting document deadline, including high school and post-secondary transcripts is the same date as the application deadline or within 10 days of submission of the application, whichever is later.

Application Deadlines

TRU begins accepting applications for most programs on October 1, 2018. Application for trades programs are accepted throughout the year. Limited admission programs do not have a posted deadline but we encourage you to complete your application early to ensure seat availability.

Application deadlines that fall on a weekend or a statutory holiday will be extended to the next working day.



ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

Every year TRU rewards first-time students with over \$400,000 in entrance scholarships and awards offers. The applications will be available online in December 2018, with an application deadline of March 1, 2019.

The minimum academic requirement is an 80% average in four grade 12 academic subjects including English. Applicants must be enrolling in a TRU program of at least two years duration.



New Buildings on Campus

ADVANCING IN HEALTHCARE:

49,000 square feet in a new \$37.2-million Nursing and Population Health Building. The facility will house advanced technology like labs, simulation mannequins and spaces similar to real healthcare settings to foster collaborative learning. Anticipated completion is in January 2020.

LEADING THE WAY IN TRADES AND TECH:

57,500-square-feet in a new, \$30-million Industrial Training and Technology Centre. The expansion creates space for new programs like power engineering, HVAC/refrigeration technician and machinist. Anticipated completion is in September 2018.

A PLANNED CAMPUS COMMUNITY:

90 acres under development as part of The Reach, a walkable, mixed-use, planned campus community. It includes 42,600 square feet of retail space, 40,000 square feet of office space and 3,500 residential units.

MAKING OLD MAIN NEW:

\$5-million revitalization project on TRU's first building (where the former Cariboo College started four decades ago), Old Main. Modernizations include upgraded infrastructure, improved lighting and soundproofing. Anticipated completion is in March 2019.
